Remembering what was in Budget 2021

The 2021 Budget, announced on 20 May, set aside nearly \$500 million to implement health reforms, giving less to the soon-to-be-defunct DHBs and providing funding boosts to several health workforces to address cost pressures, including primary care.

The Budget, dubbed the Wellbeing Budget 2021, was pitched by finance minister Grant Robertson as a continuation of New Zealand's recovery from the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the back of a better-than-expected economic performance.

#### Major new health investments

Vote Health **\$24.4 billion** in 2021/22 (vs estimated \$23.2 billion and a budgeted \$20.3 billion this year)

Health reforms \$486 million includes:

locality networks \$46 million

- Health NZ \$158.4 million
- commissioning of kaupapa Māori services \$126.8 million
- creation of the Māori Health Authority\$98 million
- Iwi-Māori partnership boards \$17.8million
